It appearing that there are funds in sight with which to pay \$3000.00 of the Loans to the Street Fund by the Bank of Picayune the Mayor and Clerk are on motion duly made and carried ordered to pay same with accrued interest at once,

It appearing that there are \$7500.00 of the 1923, School Bonds now due, the Mayor and Clerk are on motion duly made and carried ordered to pay same with accrued interest as soon as the funds are available.

RESOLUTION TO BUY LAND FOR SCHOOL PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, it has become necessary for the Board of Trustees of the Picayune Separate School District, to purchase certain land selected by the said Board, as suitable for a location and site on which to erect a large and commodious school building, for the Grammar grades, on the West side, and the funds having been provided in bond issue for school purposes, which bonds have been issued in the sum of Eighty Thousand Dollars, (\$80,000.00) at a previous meeting of this Board, and the election to authorize said Bonds by the people, having authorized and directed the purchase of a school site from the funds derived from the sale of said Bonds, and;

WHEREAS, the said School Board, has selected as a school site for said building on the West side, a certain desirable plot of land, on which a commodious school ground, and site for said building is laid out, and the said School Board have completely negotiated the contract to buy said land, for and on behalf of the

Separate School District of Picayune, and it has been agreed and deemed expedient to buy said land at a cash price, and TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$10,000.00) to be paid for same, by the order of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, now confirming and agreeing to the action of the City School Board in buying said land, It is ordered that the land be purchased and paid for as above mentioned, and which is described as follows, to-wit;

Beginning thirteen Chains North, of the South East corner of the Northwest quarter of Section 15, Township 6 South, Range 17 West, and running thence West from said place of beginning, nine and fifty-one one-hundredths Chains, to a post, thence North, nine and fifty-one one-hundredths Chains, thence East, nine and fifty-one one-hundredths Chains, thence South nine and fifty-one one-hundredths Chains to the place of beginning, containing nine (9) acres more or less, in Section 15 Township 6 South, Range, 17 West, in Pearl River County, Mississippi.

WHEREFORE, it is hereby resolved by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen at its regular meeting January 3rd, 1928, that said land as above described be purchased by the City of Picayune, for and on behalf of the Picayune Separate School District, and that upon delivery of title that this Board authorize and direct the payment of TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS, (\$10,000.00) cash to the owners of said land.

And be it further resolved, that Barney Whitfield, Mayor, and H.K. McKee, City Clerk, be and are hereby authorized to make and execute a written contract between the City of Picayune, and the owners of said land, to purchase same, at the said price of TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS, (\$10,000.00) to be paid upon delivery of the perfected title to said land, and that said contract be executed and signed by the owners and by the said Mayor and Clerk, for and on behalf of the City, binding both parties to the conveyance of said land, and that all acts and negotiations heretofore made by the City School Board, and the said Barney Whitfield, as Mayor, for the purchase of said property, be and are hereby ratified and confirmed.

RESOLUTION FOR LAND AND DISPOSITION OF BUILDINGS AND OTHER IMPROVEMENTS.

WHEREAS, it has been agreed and understood in all the negotiations to purchase a tract of land, for school purposes, on the West side, in the Picayune Separate School District, that the buildings of all kinds and descriptions, on said land were to be removed, and the said tract of land delivered to the said City, cleared of such buildings and improvements, and the said School Board, Mayor, and Clerk, having completed all negotiations, and procured a written contract, binding the parties to the sale, and conveyance of said land, and therefore, be it resolved that all of said action of the City School Board, Mayor and Clerk, be and is hereby ratified, and confirmed, and,

WHEREAS, it is necessary and expedient for the City to acquire a portion of 1 land lying directly East of the tract described in the contract for a school site generally described as the North 1/3rd of Block "A" of J.W. Simmons Sub-Division and that the acquisition of said block of land is necessary to provide frontage for neutral grounds and streets for said tract, and it appearing that the said portion of said Block "A" is owned by J.E. Stockstill, and that he offers to sell and convey same, with good title, to the City of Picayune, and that he values the

said lot of land at the sum of ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS, (\$1,000.00) with the reservation therein of a flowing artesian well, with its pipes stands, fittings and fixtures to be reserved unto himself, and used with right of ingress and egress for all purposes, incident to the operation and maintenance of said well, and the Mayor and Board of Aldermen agreeing to purchase the said lot from the said J.E. Stockstill, and the said J.E. Stockstill, agreeing to accept as a consideration of the said lot; all the buildings and improvements on the said nine (9) acres tract, acquired for a school and public purpose,

THEREFORE, it is hereby resolved by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, that the City accept a Deed from the said J.E. Stockstill, for said lot of land, and that the said City sell and deliver unto him all of the said buildings and improvements, same being residences, barns and other buildings and old fence around said tract as a consideration for the conveyance of said lot situated in Block "A" of the J.W. Simmons Sub-Division, and which lot is described particularly as follows, to-wit.

Beginning at the Northwest corner of Block "A" of said J.W. Simmons Sub-Division thence run South on the East line of Dixon Claim, now owned by George W. Stockstill, a distance of Seventy (70) feet, to a post, thence across said Block "A" parallel with its North boundary line to the Street, thence North along the boundary of the Street to the corner of said Block "A" being a distance of seventy two feet or more, according to the original plat, thence West back to the place of beginning, on the East line of said Dixon Claim in Section 15, Township 6, South, Range 17 West.

And that the said Barney Whitfield, Mayor, and H.K. McKee, City Clerk, are hereby authorized for and on behalf of the said City, and in compliance with the resolution to accept a Deed from the said J.E. Stockstill, for the said land, to execute and deliver to him a Bill of Sale for all of said buildings and improvements, on the large tract of land, acquired for school purposes, conveying same to him as of the value of ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS, (\$1,000.00) and giving the said J.E. Stockstill reasonable time to remove all of said buildings and improvements off of the said land.







FRANCHISE ORDINANCE. No 103-

AN ORDINANCE

GRANTING AN ELECTRIC FRANCHISE TO MISSISSIPPI POWER COMPANY, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS IN THE CITY OF PICAYUNE, MISSISSIPPI.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Picayune, Mississippi,

SECTION, 1, In consideration of the benefits that will accrue to the City of Picayune, and the inhabitants thereof, Mississippi Power Company, its successors and assigns, hereinafter referred to as the Grantee, is hereby given and vested with the right, authority, easement, privilege, and franchise, to construct, erect, suspend, install, renew, repair, maintain, operate, and conduct, in the City, a plant or plants and system for the manufacture of electric current for all purposes whatsoever,

SECTION, 2, The Grantee is hereby further given and vested with the right, authority, easement, privilege, and franchise, to construct, erect, suspend, install, renew, repair, maintain, operate, and conduct, in the City a system of poles, towers, conduits, cables, conductors, transforming stations, fittings and all appliances, or appurtenances necessary, or desirable to the transmission, distribution, or sale of electric current for all purposes whatsoever in the

under, along, upon, and across, all streets, avenues, alleys, ways, bridges, and public places, in the City, as they now exist or may be hereafter laid out or extended, together with the further right, privilege, and franchise, to construct, erect, suspend, install, renew, repair, maintain and operate, such poles, towers, conduits, cables, wires, conductors, transforming stations, fittings and all appliances, and appurtenances necessary, or desirable to the transmission within, into through, through over, and beyond, the City and furnishing, supplying and distributing, to the City and to the inhabitants, and corporations, both within and beyond the limits thereof electric energy for lighting heating power and all other purposes for which electric energy may be used now or hereafter, and for the purpose of extending its lines and furnishing electric current beyond the limits of the City.

SECTION 3, The poles, towers, conduits, cables, conductors, transforming stations, fittings, appliances, and appurtenances, shall be so constructed, as not unreasonably, to interfere with the proper use of the streets, alleys, ways, bridges and public places, in the City, and shall be maintained in a reasonably good condition and repair,

SECTION 4, Whenever the Grantee shall cause any opening or alteration to be made in any of the Streets, avenues, alleys, ways, bridges, or public places of the City for the purpose of installing, maintaining, operating, or repairing any poles, towers, conduits, cables, or other appliances the work shall be completed within a reasonable time, and the Grantee shall upon the completion of such work restore such portion of the Streets, avenues, alleys, ways, bridges, or other public places to as good condition as it was before the opening or alteration was so made.

SECTION 5, The Grantee shall hold the City harmless from any and all liability or damages resulting from the negligence of the Grantee in the construction, maintenance, or operation, of its poles, towers, conduits, wires, cables, and other appliances.

SECTION 6, The Grantee may, from time to time, declare, make, and enforce reasonable rules and regulations as conditions for the sale and distribution by it of electric current to any person firm or corporation.

SECTION 7, In the event the supply of electric energy shall be interrupted or fail by reason of accident or otherwise beyond the control of the Grantee, the Grantee shall restore the service within a reasonable time and such interruption shall not constitute a breach of this franchise, nor shall the Grantee be liable for damages by reason of such interruption or failure,

SECTION 8, The Grantee shall install and maintain, free of charge, meters for measuring current and shall have free access to the premises of the customer from time to time, for the purpose of reading, repairing, testing, and maintaining the meters and appurtenances, Such meters shall remain the property of the Grantee.

SECTION 9, Wherever in this Ordinance either the City or the Grantee is named or referred to, it shall be deemed to include the respective successor, successors,

or assigns of either, and all rights privileges and obligations herein conferred shall bind and inure to the benefit of such successor, successors, or assigns of the City or of the Grantee.

SECTION 10, The Grantee, its successors or assigns shall within ninety (90) days after the approval of this Ordinance by the Mayor, file a written acceptance of the Ordinance with the City Clerk.

SECTION 11, The rights hereby granted shall become effective upon the passage of this Ordinance and continue for a period of twenty five years thereafter.

SECTION 12, If any clause, provision, or section, of this Ordinance is illegal or is not embraced within the title hereof, or is not cognate to the subject expressed in the title, the remaining provisions hereof shall not be thereby affected but shall have full force and operation.

SECTION 13, The Grantee shall pay to the City Clerk the costs of publishing this Ordinance, such publication to be made in one issue of a newspaper of general circulation in, and published within the City.

SECTION 14, The public interest demanding and requiring, in the judgement of the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Picayune, that this Ordinance take effect at once, it is further ordered that this Ordinance take effect from and after its passage and approval according to law.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Picayune, Mississippi;

SECTION I, That the Mayor and the City Clerk of the City of Picayune be and are hereby authorized to make and enter into, and execute and deliver in duplicate a contract between the City of Picayune, Mississippi, on the one part, and Mississippi Power Company, a corporation, on the other part in the following form, to-wit;

THIS CONTRACT made and entered into on this the first day of June 1928 by and between, MISSISSIPPI POWER COMPANY, a corporation, its successors and assigns, hereinafter called the Company, and the CITY OF PICAYUNE, a Municipal Corporation, hereinafter called the City.

WITNESSETH,

FIRST: For and in consideration of the mutual agreements herein contained and the amount hereinafter agreed to be paid to the Company by the City, the Company hereby agrees for a period of five years from the beginning of service (not later than the 1st, day of June 1928) and continuing thereafter from year to year until the City shall have given the Company at least twelve months written notice of its intention to terminate this contract, to furnish and maintain electric current for the following street lamps at the following rates.

400-Candle power Mazda Lamps @ \$75.00 per lamp per year.

250-Candle power Mazda Lamps @ \$50.00 per lamp per year;

100-Candle power Mazda Lamps @ \$27.50 per lamp per year;

80-Candle power Mazda Lamps @ \$25.00 per lamp per year;

60-(or less) Candle power Mazda Lamps @ \$22.50 per lamp per year.

Such lamps are to be located at the places shown on the map identified by the signature of the Mayor, of the City, and the Manager of the Hattiesburg District of the Company,

Such map shall be and is hereby made a part of this contract.

The City is the owner at the present time of a certain line of poles, and certain lines of wires, cross arms, and electrical equipment used in connection therewith, and lamps maintained thereon,

Such property and lamps are included in the total number of lamps which the Company is to furnish and maintain electric current for, under the terms hereof and are shown and designated on the map of the lamps to be supplied with electric current by the Company, and made a part hereof. As to such poles, wires, cross arms, electrical equipment, and lamps owned by the City, the Company agrees to maintain and keep in repair the same in conjunction with the furnishing of current therefor, and shall have entire control and management thereof for such purposes during the life of this contract, and may replace any of such poles, wires, cross arms, electrical equipment, and lamps, whenever in its judgement it is necessary, so to do. and shall hold the City harmless against all loss, cost, expense, or damage, arising out of the maintenance and operation thereof. Any poles, wires, cross arms, electrical equipment, or lamps, furnished by the Company, to replace poles, wires, cross arms, electrical equipment, or lamps of the City, shall be and remain the property of the City.

If at the expiration of the period of this contract, any such poles wires, cross arms, electrical equipment, or lamps, of the City shall not have been replaced by the Company, and are still on hand, and a new contract is not entered into between the parties, the Company may at its option purchase the same from the City, at the actual value thereof at the end of the contract period, if such new contract is not entered into. In the event the Company desires to purchase to purchase such equipment and the parties are unable to agree as to its then actual value, then its value shall be determined by arbitration as is provided for in the sixth paragraph hereof with reference to the equipment therein referred to.

SECOND: The City agrees to take and pay for such lamp service at the following rates per lamp, per annum, to-wit.

400-Candle Power Mazda Lamps, @ \$75.00 per lamp, per year;

250-Candle Power Mazda Lamps @ \$50.00 per lamp, per year;

100-Candle Power Mazda Lamps @ \$27.50 per lamp, per year;

80- Candle Power Mazda Lamps @ \$25.00 per lamp, per year;

60- (or less) Candle Power Mazda Lamps @ \$22.50 per lamp, per year.

payable at the office of the Company in the City in equal monthly installments, on or before the tenth day of the month following the month during which such service was rendered.

THIRD: The Company agrees to furnish, and the City agrees to take from the Company, and pay for such additional lamp service as the City may need or require during the continuance of this contract at the following prices;

400- Candle Power Mazda Lamps, @ \$75.00 per lamp, per year

250- Candle Power Mazda Lamps, @ \$50.00 per lamp, per year

100- Candle Power Mazda Lamps, @ \$27.50 per lamp, per year

80 - Candle Power Mazda Lamps, @ \$25.00 per lamp, per year

60 - Candle Power Mazda Lamps @ Or less) @ \$22.50 per lamp, per year.

Each additional lamp ordered installed by the City shall immediately upon its installation become subject to all the terms and conditions of this contract.

FOURTH: It is understood and agreed that any additional lamps ordered installed by the City shall be located at such places along the existing lines of the Company within the limits of its distributing system as the City may direct; provided it is understood and agreed that where additional lamps are ordered by the City on existing lines there shall be at least one lamp for each four hundred feet of extension thereof; and provided further it is understood and agreed that the Company will make any extension of the street lighting system ordered by the City provided the City shall take and pay for lamp service of one lamp for each four hundred feet of such extension.

FIFTH, It is further understood and agreed that if after any lamp is once located the City should desire it moved at any time to a different location the Company upon receiving all cost and expense of moving such lamp will move the same to such new location, provided such location is along the existing lines of the Company within the limits of its distributing system.

SIXTH, It is further understood and agreed that no additional lamp or lamps shall be ordered installed by the City during the last year of this contract, or after the City shall have given the Company written notice of its intention to terminate this contract, unless the actual cost of installing such additional lamp or lamps is first paid to the Company; All equipment so installed at the expense of the City is to be the property of the City and may be removed by it at the expiration of the contract period provided a new contract is not entered into between the City and the Company, as hereinafter provided for in this Section; but the Company may at its option purchase the same from the City at its actual value, at the end of the contract period, if such new contract is not entered into. In the event the Company desires to purchase such equipment and the parties hereto cannot agree upon the actual value of such equipment at the end of the contract period, then its value shall be determined by two disinterested and competent persons, one of whom shall be selected by the City and the other shall be selected by the Company. If the two so selected are unable to agree, then they shall select a third disinterested and competent person. An award in writing by a majority of the persons so selected fixing the actual value of such equipment shall be final and conclusive upon the parties. In the event the City

SECTION 2, BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that it is the judgement of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Picayune, that the public interest will be best promoted by making this ordinance effective at once, and that this ordinance take effect, and be in force from and after its passage and approval according to law.

SECTION 3, Mississippi Power Company, its successors or assigns shall within ninety days from the approval of this ordinance by the Mayor, execute the contract herein contained,

SECTION 4, Mississippi Power Company shall pay the City Clerk the cost of publishing this ordinance, such publication to be made in one issue of a newspaper of general circulation in, and published within the limits of the City.





WHITE WAY ORDINANCE. 105

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF PICAYUNE, MISSISSIPPI, AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND CITY CLERK TO ENTER INTO A CONTRACT WITH MISSISSIPPI POWER COMPANY FOR A TERM OF NOT LESS THAN FIVE YEARS FROM JUNE THE FIRST 1928, FOR WHITE WAY LIGHTING, FIXING THE RATES TO BE PAID FOR SUCH SERVICE, AND PROVIDING THE FORM OF SUCH CONTRACT AND AUTHORIZING ITS EXECUTION AND DELIVERY.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Picayune, Mississippi.

SECTION I, That the Mayor and City Clerk of the City of Picayune, be and are hereby authorized to make and enter into, and execute and deliver in duplicate a contract, between the City of Picayune, Mississippi, on the one part, and Mississippi Power Company, a corporation, on the other part, in the following form,

CONTRACT FOR WHITE WAY LIGHTING.

Ornamental System

Service Classification, "MS"

AGREEMENT made this 1st day of June 1928 by and between MISSISSIPPI POWER COMPANY, hereinafter called the Company, and the City of Picayune, hereinafter called the Consumer,

IN CONSIDERATION of the mutual agreements hereinafter contained, IT IS AGREED:

FIRST: That during the term of five years from the beginning of service, (Not later than the 1st day of June 1928), and thereafter until the expiration of at least six months written notice by either party to the other party of its intention to terminate this agreement, the Company shall maintain sufficient line capacity to enable it to deliver to the Consumer, at a division switch known as the point of service, to the Consumer, and identified, on the attached map as the dividing point between the Company's and the Consumers property, in Pearl River County Mississippi, electric power in the form of single phase, alternating current, at approximately sixty cycles periodicity, and at approximately 2200 volts pressure for not less than the following number of lamps.

- Lamps 40- 400 Candle Power series Incandescent Lamps.
- 20- 400 Candle Power Lamps burning from "Dusk to dawn"
- 20- 400 candle Power Lamps burning from "dusk to 11 p.m."

located as shown on the attached map approved by the Mayor of the City of Picayune and the General Manager of the Mississippi Power Company, and hereby made a part of this contract for which the consumer shall pay the Company at the following rates.

RATE.

The following rates shall apply for this service.

1.25 cents per watt, per month for the first 3000 watts connected; plus, 1.00 cents per watt per, month for the next 7000 watts connected; plus .75 cents per watt per month for all over 10,000 watts connected.

Where Consumer desires the Company to operate all or any part of installation on a "dusk to dawn" all night schedule, an addition to above rates of .5 cents per watt per month will be charged for all lamps operated on such schedule.

The above charges include free renewals of standard lamps of not less than 400 Candle Power, and patrol service and regulating transformer and switches.

The wattage shall be determined from the lamp manufacturer's rating of the lamps installed.

SECOND, The Consumer agrees to pay the Company monthly for such Whiteway lighting at the rates set forth herein, and in the event a new schedule of rates, is made effective by the consent of the parties, to pay for the service delivered during the remainder of the term of this agreement, at the rates set forth in such new schedule.

THIRD, In the event the City fails to pay such monthly installments for all lamps as it may owe under this contract, the Company may, at its option,

discontinue such service until full payment is made thereon, but this contract shall not be otherwise affected, Upon full payment of all sums due hereunder, with interest thereon, service shall be restored by the Company.

FOURTH, It is further agreed that in the event the supply of electric energy should be interrupted or fail by reason of accident or conditions beyond the control of the Company, the Company shall restore the service within a reasonable time, and such interruption shall not constitute a breach of this contract, nor shall the Company be liable for damages by reason of such interruption or failure. For any such interruption or failure of one or more lamps longer than three hours the Company shall for such time credit the City with the pro-rata cost of the lighting of such lamp or lamps during such time as it or they may be out.

FIFTH, Everything beyond the division switch, excepting lamp renewals regulating transformer, and switches necessary for controlling the hours of burning will be owned and maintained by the consumer, if such transformer or switches are burned out or become ineffective they shall be replaced by the Company, and the Company shall own such transformer or switches so replaced by it.

The Consumer shall use reasonable diligence to protect the property of the Company, and shall reimburse the Company for injury or damage suffered by it resulting from defects beyond the point of service, or from the negligence of the Consumer, and shall indemnify it against liability for injury or damage so suffered by third parties, and the Company shall not be liable for any accident, damage or injury, to any person or property whatsoever, arising out of or in any way connected with the service furnished or to be furnished hereunder.

SIXTH, A waiver of one or more defaults shall not be considered a waiver of any other or subsequent default.

ORDINANCE NO. 106.

AN ORDINANCE TO CREATE THE APPOINTIVE OFFICE OF MUNICIPAL JAILOR, AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE KEEPING AND CARE OF THE CITY JAIL, PRESCRIBING RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR A TURN-KEY FOR PRISONERS, AND KEEPING THE RECORD THEREOF ON A POLICE JAIL DOCKET.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Picayune in Pearl River County, Mississippi,

Section, 1. That there is hereby created the appointive office of municipal Jailor, and that the care and custody and turn key for all prisoners in and out of the municipal Jail shall be done by a Police officer, appointed and selected by this Board to have charge of said Jail from 7.00 o'clock A.M. until 7.00 o'clock P.M. and the same duties for a night Jailor who shall likewise have charge from 7.00 o'clock P.M. until 7.00 A.M.

Section, 2. No person shall be entitled to have in their possession, keys locks or fasteners to the City Jail except the one or more police officers designated as the City Jailor or Jailors, and that the officers so appointed shall be charged with the duty of acting as City Jailor during the hours for which he is appointed.

Section, 3. The duties of the City Jailor shall be that he will be Turn-key, to lock and unlock, or otherwise operate the fasteners to the City jail to admit and release prisoners to and from the jail,

When any other officer acting for the City, County, State, or U.S. Government shall have a prisoner, or prisoners, which such officers shows to have legally, in his custody, and to be legally detained he shall make an application to the City Jailor, then in charge, to have the jailor admit such prisoner to the City jail.

Before such prisoner or prisoners, under arrest and in custody of County State or Federal officers shall be admitted to the jail by the jailor complete entry of the record of such prisoner or prisoners giving the name of the officer making the application, and the charge made against such prisoner, is to be made on the jail docket, in the manner hereinafter provided for in this Ordinance.

Section, 4. When any officer, other than the police officers in the employment of the City, shall apply to the jailor, to place prisoners in the municipal jail, it shall be the duty of the jailor to have such officer sign an agreement in the following words and figures to wit;

"I, _____ an officer of _____ hereby make applica-
 tion to the jailor of the City of Picayune to be allowed to detain prisoners
 to-wit; _____ on charges of, _____
 in the City Jail, and in consideration of a jail fee of 25¢ hereby paid, for the
 benefit of the City of Picayune, the said officer is hereby allowed to jail said
 prisoner, or prisoners in the municipal jail for the convenience of said officer,
 in promptly delivering the said prisoner, or prisoners to the proper court, or courts
 for trial, and it is hereby agreed by the undersigned officer that the City of
 Picayune is hereby relieved of any liability or connection with the arrest or deten-
 tion of said prisoner, or prisoners, whether the same be lawful or unlawful, and
 the undersigned officer having rented the said jail for the purpose of detaining
 the said prisoner, or prisoners, and acting under the authority of (State) or
 Government) _____ declares that the said City and its officers
 are in no way responsible for the arrest and detention of said prisoner, or prisoners
 and that the said City shall not be held liable for the incarceration, or any in-
 jury or ill treatment, that may have been or may be inflicted upon the said prisoners
 Witness my signature this the _____ day of _____ 19__

Section No. 5. JAIL DOCKET. That when the Jailor admits a prisoner, or prisoners
 into the municipal Jail there shall be entered on the jail Docket, to be provided and
 kept in the open hall near the jail door, the name address, sex, and the color of each
 of such prisoners, also the name of the officer who made the arrest, and who produces t
 the prisoner to be placed in the jail, and the charge that has been made against each
 prisoner, the date and the hour that each one was placed in the jail. If the applicati
 tion is made by an officer other than a city officer, as provided by section No 4
 and a prisoner is admitted on such application and agreement such officer must further
 arrange for providing the prisoner or prisoners with regular meals, and if such offi-
 cer cannot remain present in the City to attend to furnishing the meals such officer
 shall specify the number of hours that said prisoner is to be detained, and deposit
 with the City jailor a sum in cash sufficient to pay for the meals during such
 hours.

That the said jail docket shall also have a column or space provided to
 show what date and hour each prisoner was released from the jail and to whom the
 city jailor delivered each prisoner, and the total charge and expense for each to
 be kept. It shall be the duty of the night jailor to provide prisoners with
 breakfast, and the duty of the day jailor to provide other meals and necessities
 during the day. The Jailor shall keep an account of and render statements for meals
 and other necessities to the Board.

Section, No. 6. When prisoners sentenced to serve in the jail on conviction by the
 City municipal Courts, record of their time is to be kept after trial by the City
 Clerk, who shall keep an account thereafter of the time served, as is now usually k
 kept in the Clerk's office, and who shall advise the jailor in writing of the

of the date of release of each convict.

Section No. 7. That this Ordinance take effect and be enforced from and after its passage and publication as required by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 107

AN ORDINANCE TO PROHIBIT DOGS (MALE AND FEMALE) FROM RUNNING AT LARGE IN THE CITY OF PICAYUNE, WITH EXCEPTIONS, AND TO PROVIDE FOR TAKING SAME UP, EMPOUNDING AND DIPOSING OF SAME, AND FIXING THE FEES THEREFOR, AND PROHIBITING KENNELS ETC. FOR INCLOSING DOGS AND MAKING SAME A MISDEMEANOR WITH PENALTY.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Picayune, Mississippi.

Section 1, That all dogs are hereby prohibited from running at large in the municipality of Picayune, in any place or on any property, not the enclosure of the owner or keeper, except when same shall be accompanied by the owner, and under his control or except such animal be muzzled as hereinafter provided. The term dog herein used, shall apply to all of the species, male and female.

Section 2 When a dog shall be taken up for the violation of this ordinance, the officer taking same up shall at once notify the owner, who shall be required to appear at empounding place for dogs, and pay all charges and take the animal in charge. If the owner fails to take the dog after notice, or if the owner be unknown, the officer shall turn in the written description of same to the City Clerk, who shall enter same on record in the book kept for other live stock, under other live stock ordinances of the City, and record the name of the owner if known, otherwise be marked "Unknown"

Section, 3, After record is made of the animal the officer taking same up shall advertise same for sale, for five full days, for the charges and fees due, by posting notices in three public places, one of which shall be at the front door of the City Hall, and one at the pounding place, therein giving complete description of the animal, and the name of the Owner if known, otherwise marked "Owner Unknown"

The sale shall be at auction to the highest bidder to pay cost and expenses, and the amount shall be reported to the City Clerk, and after deduction of fees cost and expenses, the balance paid to the owner if known, if unknown same is to be paid into the General Fund of the City.

Section 4. The charges, fees, and cost for taking up and impounding and finally disposing of a dog shall be as follows.

Taking up and impounding	\$1.00
Advertising for sale,	1.00
Releasing	.50
Making public sale,	.50
Filing description with clerk	.25
For feeding and watering, per day,	.50

Section 5. Other proceedings; The owner may appear at any time before sale and pay the charges, and receive such animal. If the owner appears at any time before sale and desires to contest the legality of the taking up of any animal, he may file a written affidavit with the officer taking up such animal, simply disputing that the animal was legally taken up, and was so taken up while not in violation of this ordinance, and it shall be the duty of the officer to immediately return the said affidavit to the City Clerk, with the description of the animal, and it shall be the duty of the Clerk to enter the cause on the Mayor's docket and set the cause for hearing, on the advice of the Mayor if he is present, but not longer than two days hence, and if not present, give notice to the Mayor of said issue, whose duty it shall be to try said cause, and make a final order of his decision, The owner may receive the dog upon filing his affidavit, by depositing the estimated cost, not to exceed \$10.00 or by executing a cost bond for not less than \$25.00, with good sureties, payable to the City.

If the contestant is successful at the hearing, the order of the Mayor shall be to deliver the dog to the contestant without cost, if unsuccessful the contestant shall be taxed with the cost, and this ordinance carried out. All cost in the trial shall be the same as in their civil cases.

Section 6. At the public sale of any dog if there is no bid received, and no person will pay the charges and take such dog then the same shall be struck off and declared sold to the City, and when any dog is sold to the City the same is hereby declared to be a nuisance, and it shall be the duty of the officer taking same up to kill and dispose of the carcass of such dog or dogs as is now required by State law.

Section 7. A dog may be carried about the City, in the custody of an owner or keeper, if chained or otherwise fastened, but if not fastened same must be muzzled with a good and secure metal muzzle, securely fastened over the mouth and nose of the dog.

Dogs running at large promiscuously on the public streets and alleys unaccompanied by an owner or keeper shall be taken up whether muzzled or not. Any dog pilfering or trespassing upon the premises of any person other than the owner, shall be taken u

up whether muzzled or not.

Section 8 . That this ordinance take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication according to law.

The within and foregoing ordinance was reduced to writing, read and considered by sections at a public meeting of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Picayune, Mississippi, and upon motion of Mr. E.M.Walker, seconded by Mr. L.N. AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF PICAYUNE, MISSISSIPPI, AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND CITY CLERK TO ENTER INTO A CONTRACT WITH MISSISSIPPI POWER COMPANY FOR A TERM OF NOT LESS THAN FIVE YEARS FROM JUNE 1ST 1928, FOR THE NECESSARY TRAFFIC SIGN LIGHTS FOR THE STREETS OF THE CITY OF PICAYUNE, FIXING THE RATES TO BE PAID FOR SUCH SERVICE, AND PROVIDING THE FORM OF SUCH CONTRACT, AND AUTHORIZING ITS EXECUTION AND DELIVERY.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Picayune, Mississippi.

SECTION 1. That the Mayor and City Clerk of the City of Picayune, be and are hereby authorized to make and enter into, and execute, and deliver, in duplicate a contract between the City of Picayune, Mississippi, on the one part, and Mississippi Power Company, a corporation, on the other part, in the following form, to-wit:
STATE OF MISSISSIPPI,
COUNTY OF PEARL RIVER,

THIS CONTRACT, made and entered into as of the first day of June 1928, by and between, Mississippi Power Company, a corporation, its successors and assigns, hereinafter called the Company, and the City of Picayune, a municipal corporation, hereinafter called the City.

W I T N E S S E T H :

First, For and consideration of the mutual agreements herein contained, and the amount hereinafter agreed to be paid to the Company by the City, the Company hereby agrees, for a period of five years from the beginning of service, not later than the 1st day of June 1928, and continuing thereafter from year to year until the City shall have given the Company at least twelve months written notice of its intention to terminate this contract, to furnish and maintain electric current for the

following street traffic sign lights, at the rate schedule "MA" as follows.

MISSISSIPPI POWER COMPANY.

SERVICE CLASSIFICATION "MA"

RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL LIGHTING.

110-220 Volts.

TRANSMISSION SYSTEM.

Availability.

Available for general lighting purposes to any customer, served by the transmission system over the retail distribution line of the Company, in urban centers.

Rate.

10¢ per KWH for the first 30 KWH consumed per month, plus
8¢ per KWH for the next 170 KWH consumed per month, plus,
7¢ per KWH for the next 300 KWH consumed per month, plus
6¢ per KWH for the next 350 KWH consumed per month, plus,
5¢ per KWH for all over 850 KWH consumed per month.

Minimum,

In consideration of the readiness of the Company to furnish such service the customer will pay to the Company a monthly minimum bill of two Dollars, in communities where not more than 100 customers are served under this classification, a monthly minimum of one & 50/100 Dollars where from 100 to 250 customers, are served under this classification, a monthly minimum, bill of one Dollars and twenty five cents where from 250 to 3500 customers, are served under this classification, a monthly bill of one Dollars where over 3500m customers are served under this classification.

Payment.

The above rates are net and become delinquent after ten days from date of bill.

Deposit.

A deposit of \$2.50 or more if deemed advisable shall be required of each customer before service is connected at premises designated, which deposit may be applied to any unpaid bills against the customer for service or material.

1

Such traffic sign lights are to be located at the places shown on map identified by the signatures of the Mayor of the City and the Manager of the second district of the Company.

Such map shall be and is hereby made a part of this contract.

SECOND, The City agrees to take and pay for such lamps at the rate hereinbefore designated, payable at the office of the Company in the City of Picayune in equal monthly installments on or before the tenth day of the month following the month during which service was rendered.

THIRD. The Company further further agrees to furnish, and the City agrees to take form the Company, and pay for such additional traffic sign lights, as the City may need or require during the continuance of this contract at the aforesaid rates.

Each additional traffic sign light desired shall be installed by the City and shall immediately upon its installation become subject to all the terms and

conditions of this contract.

FOURTH. The City shall maintain such traffic sign lights, and furnish and maintain the lamps therefor, and the switch for turning the current on and off, and the wire cable connecting the traffic sign lights with the switch located on the light pole on the side of the street adjacent thereto. The hours of burning shall be controlled by the City.

The Company will, from time to time, on notice from the City or its representatives have the work of renewing the lamps done for the City, free of charge, the City however to furnish the lamps it desired to have renewed or replaced.

FIFTH, IN the event the City fails to pay such monthly installments for all lamps it may owe under this contract, the Company may, at its option, discontinue such service until payment is made therefor, with interest thereon, but this contract shall not be otherwise affected. Upon full payment of all sums due hereunder with interest thereon, service shall be restored by the Company.

SIXTH, It is further agreed that in the event the supply of electric energy should be interrupted or fail by reason of accident, or conditions beyond the control of the Company, the Company shall restore the service within a reasonable time, and such interruption shall not constitute a breach of this contract. Now shall the Company be liable for damages by reason of such interruption or failure.

SEVENTH, Wherever in this contract either the City or the Company is named or referred to, it shall be deemed to include the respective successor, successors or assigns of either, and all rights privileges and obligations herein contained by or on behalf of the City, or by and on behalf of the Company, shall bind and inure to the benefit of the respective successor, successors, or assigns of the City or of the Company, whether so expressed or not.

EIGHTH, A waiver of one or more defaults shall not be considered a waiver of any other or subsequent default.




AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SANITARY ORDINANCE NO. 92, SECTIONS ONE AND TWO THEREOF, AND TO REPEAL PARAGRAPH "B" OF SECTION THREE DESIGNATED, "BOX AND CAN PRIVY"

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Picayune, Mississippi,

SECTION 1, That Section one of Sanitary Ordinance No, 92, of the City of Picayune, be amended to read as follows, "That it shall be unlawful for any person within the City of Picayune, to throw out, deposit, or in any other way dispose of human excreta, other than into a sanitary water closet, a properly constructed "Pit Privy", a Septic Tank or other sanitary toilet device, approved by the City Health department. "

SECTION 2, That Section 3 of Ordinance No. 92, be amended to read as follows "That all property owners owning property as designated in Section 2, shall have installed a properly constructed, pit privy, septic tank, or other toilet device approved by the City Health department."

SECTION 3, That Paragraph "B" designated "Box and Can Privy" of said Ordinance No. 92 be and is hereby repealed.

Section 4, That "Box and Can Privies" are hereby prohibited in the municipality of Picayune, and the existing "Box and Can Privies" are to be replaced placed by users and property owners by other suitable methods of disposal.

SECTION 3, All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed, the public health requiring it this Ordinance shall take effect and be enforced immediately upon its passage.

CASIMIRUS MULLER.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE LOTS AND OTHER ENCLOSURES WHERE HOGS ARE KEPT IN PICKENS, MISSISSIPPI.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Pickens, Mississippi.

SECTION 1, that hog pens, or other enclosure of whatever kind or description, in which hogs are confined, are hereby required to be removed to isolated districts, or places at a distance of not less than 500 feet from residences or places of habitation, and all other public buildings which are used by the inhabitants of the City, or where people congregate for any purpose. That all persons firms or corporations are hereby prohibited from keeping or maintaining, hog pens or other enclosure in which hogs are kept at any place within the municipality, that is within 500 feet of any residence or building used by the inhabitants or where people congregate for any purpose.

SECTION 2. that all persons maintaining such enclosures in which hogs are kept are hereby required to remove and maintain same in accordance with Section One hereof.

SECTION 3, that any person firm or corporation that shall violate the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction may be fined as much as \$50.00 at the discretion of the court.

SECTION 4. that this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage for good cause shown, for public health.

ORDINANCE No. 110

AN ORDINANCE, to regulate the production and sale of milk, and certain milk products in the City of Picayune, Mississippi, providing the method of enforcement and the penalties for its violation.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Picayune, Pearl River County, Mississippi,

SECTION I, That the regulations of the Mississippi State Board of Health, entitled "The Production And Sale of Milk, And Certain Milk Products", as now promulgated and in force, or as may hereafter be amended, shall be, and does constitute the milk code of the City of Picayune,

SECTION II, It shall be the duty of the Health Officer, his agents or assistants to carry out and enforce the provisions of this Ordinance.

SECTION III, All milk sold or distributed in the City of Picayune, shall be graded as provided for in the regulations of the Mississippi State Board of Health,

SECTION IV, Milk which does not conform to the following grades, as described in the regulations of the Mississippi State Board of Health, shall not be sold in the City of Picayune, Namely, A-B-C-&-D, raw milk, and A-B-&-C-, pasteurized milk,

SECTION, V. If any Section, provision, clause, or part of this Ordinance, shall be declared to be unconstitutional, or invalid, the same shall not effect the validity of this Ordinance as a whole, nor any part or section thereof, other than the particular clause, provision or Section so declared to be unconstitutional, or invalid, as the remaining portions of this Ordinance would have been passed by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Picayune, if the unconstitutional or invalid Section, Sections, clauses thereof had been elided by the said Mayor and Board of Aldermen before the passage of this Ordinance.

SECTION, VI, That any person engaged in the production, preparation, sale, offer for sale, storage, or distribution of milk, or certain milk products, as defined in the regulations of the Mississippi State Board of Health, or any person hauling or having control, of, or using any milk or milk product, milk container or receptacle, as described in said regulations, who shall violate any provisions of this Ordinance, or any lawful rules or regulations of the Department of Health of the City of Picayune, duly promulgated, shall upon conviction thereof, be fined not less than ~~TEN~~ DOLLARS, (~~\$10.00~~) nor more than FIFTY DOLLARS, (50.00), provided, however, that the infliction of any fine or penalty upon the person, so violating any provision of this Ordinance, shall not be held to abrogate, nullify, limit, or take away from the Department of Health, or the Health Officer, the right to revoke any permit, issued under the provisions of this Ordinance, Each days violation of this Ordinance shall be a separate offense.

SECTION VII, That this Ordinance shall be, and does constitute all of the Ordinances of the City of Picayune, pertaining to the regulation, handling and sale of milk in the City of Picayune, and all Ordinances and parts of Ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION, VIII, That this Ordinance take effect from and after its passage and approval according to law, the matter being one of urgency and necessity, and the public welfare requiring it.

ORDINANCE No. 113

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE MAINTAINANCE, OWNERSHIP AND CONTROL, OF A MUNICIPAL CEMETERY, FOR THE CITY OF PICAYUNE, MISSISSIPPI, AND THE CREATION OF A CEMETERY COMMISSION, AND THEIR SUCCESSORS IN OFFICE TO CARRY OUT SUCH PURPOSE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF PICAYUNE MISSISSIPPI.

Section, 1, That the plot of land heretofore purchased, and now owned by the City, adjoining the Palestine Cemetery be and is hereby designated as the Municipal Cemetery for Picayune, under the name of "Palestine Cemetery".

Section 2, That there is hereby created a board of commissioners, hereby designated as commissioners of the cemetery, constituted of five members to be appointed by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, that shall be as follows.

One for a period of five years, from the first Monday in January 1929 and the other four for such time that the Board shall fill a vacancy by appointment at the regular January meeting in 1930, and each year thereafter.

Section 3, The commissioners shall be custodians of the Cemetery property. They shall have the same platted into burial lots of such sizes and varieties as will suit for family burial lots of two or more persons. They shall cause a correct and intelligent plat to be made and certified to by the Engineer, or surveyor, and in duplicate; one of which shall be on file at the City Clerk's office.

The commissioners are hereby authorized and empowered to contract, to sell and agree to convey the various burial plots and lots as shall be shown and described on the plat, to persons who shall desire said lots.

The said commissioners shall be charged with the duties of providing for the up-keep of said cemetery; the repairs, clearing, cleaning and beautifying of said ground and burial lots.

The said commissioners shall have the right and power to make such conditional sales and contracts on said burial lots, as will require the purchasers thereof to pay into the funds of the commissioners by the year or semi-yearly such reasonable sums as will be necessary to keep said grounds clean and beautified.

Section 4, The Board of Commissioners and their successors in office shall have power and authority to provide reasonable rules and regulations for the care and maintainance of said cemetery, and to prescribe reasonable rules and regulations for the burial of persons who do not own lots and the compensation therefor; and the said commissioners shall cause a record to be kept of all interments by a record of the name and date.

The said commissioners and their successors in office shall enter into written contract with purchasers for the sale of burial lots, setting forth the consideration and the terms and conditions of the sale as to annual or semi-annual assessments on each lot sold for the up-keep of the property.

The said contracts shall be in writing, and impose a uniform burden on all owners, and be signed by the commissioners, and the commissioners shall cause the original, or a duplicate thereof to be filed with the City Clerk, to be filed by him as a permanent record, and in order that the Mayor and Board may order a conveyance of the lots to the purchasers in accord therewith,

Section 5, A commissioner may be removed from office for failure or refusal to perform actively the duties of his office, upon a recommendation for such removal, made and signed by three other commissioners, stating fully the causes for removal, and of which the commissioner, to be so removed, have ten days notice of the charge and recommendation of his removal.

Section 6, The commissioners shall make a written semi-annual report to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, which shall embody a detailed report of all funds received from any source whatsoever, donations subscriptions or otherwise, and of all disbursements. Same to be made at the February and July meeting of the Board each year.

The said report shall be certified to as to correctness, and signed by three or more of said commissioners.

Section 7, This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval according to law.

Your petitioner shows that in making said assessment, of said lands, for said years, your honorable body raised the valuation of said property, and of each piece or parcel thereof, to the amount of the said valuation, as shown on said list marked Exhibit "A". That the said raise in said valuation, of said property, by your honorable Board, was a great increase in valuation, of the same property, over the assessment thereof in said municipality, for the years 1926 and 1927, and was also a very material increase of said property from the assessment filed by your Clerk, of said Town, with the Mayor and Board of Aldermen thereof, That your petitioner's property was increased, in valuation over the assessment thereof for the years 1926 and 1927, to the amount of approximately \$62,000.00, and that said increase in valuation is not warranted under any circumstances,

Petitioner further shows that said property has really decreased in valuation instead of increasing in valuation since said assessment of 1926 and 1927 that there has been generally circulated in the municipality of Picayune a rumor

or statement that the mills located in said City and which constitute the principal industrial activity, of said City of Picayune, will be in operation for only a few years, as their timber supply will be exhausted, and it has caused the value of the property to decrease, and has also caused a decrease in the demand for property in said City.

Petitioner further shows to your honorable Board that a large part of said lands owned by petitioner, and described in said Exhibit "A" are low and wet and non-salable, and all of said property is vacant property, from which no income whatever is derived by your petitioner, that most of said property is inaccessible to the waterworks located in said municipality, and has no pipe lines for water in or near said property, and water can only be obtained by the owner of said land at a large expense to himself, and this fact materially effects the valuation of said property as compared with property owners, having the advantage of a good water supply.

Petitioner further shows that while a large part of said property is platted into town lots and streets and alleys of which have been dedicated for street purposes, the said City has not opened said streets, nor worked said streets, therefore the said lots have none of the advantages of lots located on opened and worked and maintained streets of said City. In fact practically the only privilege the owner of said lots has by reason of their being located within said municipality of Picayune is that of having the said lots assessed at an exceedingly high valuation, and that of being required, to pay taxes on said property at much more than is just and equitable, and at a higher rate than other tax-payers of said City.

Petitioner further shows that the said property described in said Exhibit "A" is assessed for taxation in an amount in excess of its real value, and for an amount out of proportion to the assessment of property owned by other parties in said City of Picayune, and is assessed at a sum in excess of its assessable valuation, and therefore petitioner is entitled to have said assessment reduced,

Petitioner therefore shows that the assessing of said property by your Honorable Board, at the valuation thereof, for the years 1928 and 1929, amounts to a confiscation of petitioners said property and is unauthorized under the law of the State of Mississippi, and petitioner feeling aggrieved, by reason of said assessment hereby demands an appeal to the Circuit Court of Pearl River County, from said assessment of said property as herein referred to.

Petitioner tenders herewith a good and valid Bond in the sum of \$6,000.00 being more than double the amount involved, as provided by law, and he prays that said bond be accepted, filed and approved, and that the Clerk of your Honorable Board prepare and file a transcript of said assessment, and all papers connected therewith, with the Clerk of the Circuit Court of Pearl River County as is required by law.






ORDINANCE # 114 ✓

AN ORDINANCE TO PROHIBIT THE RUNNING OF ANY WATER OR OTHER REFUSE SUBSTANCE, OILS GREASES OR SLOP, UPON OR ACROSS THE SIDE-WALKS IN THE MUNICIPALITY AND FIXING THE PENALTY THEREFOR.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF PICAYUNE, MISSISSIPPI,

Section, 1, That it shall be unlawful for and person firm or corporation, to cause the running or throwing of water, slop, oil, gas, grease, or any other refuse liquid substance, over or upon the concrete side-walk, or side-walks otherwise constructed, in the municipality. It shall be unlawful for any person firm or corporation, to allow any water to run from any roof or gutter, connected with roof drainage, to run or pour the water directly on the four foot side walk maintained in front of or around, any property in the municipality.

Section, 2, That any person who shall be convicted of the violation hereof shall be fined any sum not to exceed \$10.00 for each offense, and each day shall

constitute a separate offenses.

Section 3, That this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication as required by law.

The above and foregoing ordinance was first reduced to writing, read and considered by section at an public meeting of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen held Friday night December 21st 1928, and on its final passage the vote was as follows.
